

Their Endings. -- The general diminutive endings are: -ito, -ico, -illo, -uelo-cito, -cico, -cilio, zuelo-ecito, -ecico, -ecillo, -ezuelo-cecito, -cecico, -cecillo, cezuelo Occasional endings are: -ejo, -ijo, -in, -ete, -ezno, -ucho Remark. --Diminutives are inflected as to the gender and number. 2. How They Are Subjoined. --They are immediately subjoined to the word when this ends in a consonant or in-y; otherwise, they replace the last vowel of the word: animal, animalito, casa, casita cajn, cajoncito, paseo, paseito flor, florecita, mano, manecita buey, bueyecito, cordera, corderuela voz, vocecita, rey, reyezuelo 3. Alterations Of The Stbm Before Recisiving The Endings: (a) regular euphonic changes: --final C, g, gu and z, before receiving the diminutive ending become respectively qu, gu, g, and c: frac, fraquecito, dress coat...
